They may also be exposed to the various dangers and corrupting influences due to the new-found freedom. The students are divided into manageable groups and entrusted to the care of an experience and considerate teacher who can provide a sympathetic ear and expert advice in both academic and personal matters. Generally, the teacher is the class teacher who has a greater rapport with the students. The mentees can also seek personal support from their mentors as sometimes they cannot share their problems in such matters with their family members or friends. The mentors try to resolve the situation in the best possible way, by winning the trust of the students under their mentorship and using their good offices as well as academic and psychological experience.

a) Laboratory Centralized computer labs, language labs and psychology labs and technical labs have been established in all the Campuses of the University. All the computers have Wi-Fi connection and are internet enabled. Timely payment of Wi-Fi bills is ensured to enable Timely maintenance of the computers, related peripherals and other equipment is carried out as per requirement. Records of the maintenance of laboratory equipment are available with the Lab in-charge under the supervision of the Head of the concerned Department. The students are allowed inside the labs only when the concerned teacher is present in the lab. They are not allowed to enter the lab or conduct experiments in lab in the absence of the concerned teacher. b) Computers Besides Computer labs, computers have been provided in the offices of the Principal, Heads of the Departments, administration section, finance section and staff rooms. These computers are used by the teaching and non-teaching staff for office work and for preparing teaching material by the teachers. Besides yearly inspection and repair, the computers and their peripherals are maintained and repaired as and when required. c) Library Books for the Central

Library, Campus Libraries and Departmental Libraries are procured as per the recommendations of the concerned library committees. The Library committees invite suggestions / requirement from the teachers and make recommendations to the respective Principals taking into consideration the available funds and urgency of the requirement. The students and research scholars may borrow 2 and 3 books respectively for 15 days. After that, the borrowings may be renewed depending upon the availability of the copies of the book and demand by other users. d) Sports Complex There is no dedicated sports complex as such, but various campuses have gyms and indoor games facilities for the use by the students and teachers under the supervision of sports teacher. The Staff residing at the campus and the Hostel inmates make the optimum use of these facilities. The maintenance of sports and gym equipment in these facilities is carried out as per the report of the sports teacher and the recommendation of the sports committee. e) Classrooms The classrooms are routinely inspected by the campus authorities such as the Principal and the concerned committees. In case, some repair work is needed, appropriate measures are taken by the administration. Repairs of the furniture and other fixtures are generally carried out during the summer breaks so that the class work is not affected.

To cater to this need, the services of an agency were hired during 2016-17. But later it was released that the university was in a position to create our own custom made system using its own resources. So, from this year, the university decided to incorporate an efficient Management Information System (MIS) for Examination Section of the University and we are happy to note that the system worked excellently. Encouraged by this, the

university plans to extend the system to admission process as well so that we have a centralized online admission system in place by the next year.
